# AUGUST 2017 RENTAL PRICES RENT.COM.AU MONTHLY SNAPSHOT



Rent.com.au has released its latest report based on property leasing data for the month of August 2017. The report illustrates the shift in median rental property prices (both metro and regional), rental affordability (the median room price metric) and the price of walkability through Rent.com.au's integrated Walk Score® data.

**Key Points:** 

- Darwin recorded a fall in house prices in August, down 8 per cent now \$460/week.
- Apartment prices back up in Darwin, now \$370/week.
- Time on market improves across all capital cities except **Brisbane**, now 28.1 days.
- Most significant decrease in time on market seen in Hobart, down 35% to 10.9 days.
- Perth sees early signs of change in market, as apartment median rent prices rise.

Rent.com.au's August report illustrates that while the national median rent remained consistent for apartments and houses across the country's larger states, **Darwin** reported a considerable drop in house prices; median rents in the Northern Territory capital fell 8 per cent from July to August, now \$460/week.

The August data also showed improvements in time on market across all capital cities, the exception being **Brisbane**; the Queensland capital saw a 0.8 per cent increase month-on-month, bringing its time on market to 28.1 days on average. Properties in **Hobart** recorded the most substantial change in time on market across the country, down 35 per cent from July (16.8 days) to 10.9 days in August. In a change from RENT's July report, apartment prices jumped back up 5.7 per cent in **Darwin** in August, now \$370/week.

In August, **Sydney** continued to outrank all other Australian capitals in median rent prices. Broken down by dwelling type, the New South Wales capital recorded an increase in apartment prices (up 1.85 per cent to \$550/week) and house prices (up 2.5 per cent to \$615/week).

# **Apartment prices**

Despite issues with housing oversupply in **Perth** metro, the Western Australian capital recorded its first increase in apartment median rents in more than six months. Apartment prices have been steady for some time, but rose in August to \$320/week (up 3.23 per cent) – perhaps an early sign of turnaround for the WA market. Apartment prices also rose in **Sydney** (now \$550/week, up 3.23 per cent),

**Darwin** (now \$370/week, up 5.71 per cent), **Hobart** (now \$320/week, up 3.23 per cent) and in **Adelaide** (\$285/week, up 1.79 per cent).

Conversely, prices dropped in just three out of the eight Australian capitals, easing pressure on house hunters. **Canberra** rents saw the most significant drop out of the three, down 2.38 per cent to \$410/week in August, while **Brisbane** and **Melbourne** also recorded price decreases, down 1.27 per cent (\$390/week) and 1.25 per cent (\$395/week) respectively.

## **House prices**

At a national level, house prices remained steady in August, with upward movement only noted in **Sydney** (\$615/week, up 2.5 per cent) and **Canberra** (\$490/week, up 1.03 per cent). Rents in **Brisbane**, **Adelaide** and **Perth** were unaffected month-onmonth.

Conditions were varied, however, in three metro areas: **Darwin** house prices dropped 8 per cent to \$460/week, the most notable of all changes from July to August. **Hobart** prices fell 2.6 per cent to \$375/week, while properties in the **Melbourne** market also recorded a slight drop – down 2.44 per cent to \$400/week.

Figures from RENT's August report show Adelaide's median house price has remained unchanged for the last six months – still \$350/week.

### The median price-per-room metric

Notwithstanding a rise in apartment prices, **Perth** held its lead as the capital with the cheapest room prices in August; prices were consistently lower than all other capitals since the start of the year.

Perth's price-per room again dropped in August to \$120/week, down 3.03 per cent. **Adelaide** followed close behind, despite a price increase of 1.32 per cent to \$128/week.

In total, six out eight capitals recorded prices less than the national median price-per-room at \$175/week. The country's priciest rooms could be found in **Sydney** at \$275/week across all dwelling types. Broken down, it would cost a renter \$325/week for a room in Sydney, against the house price-per-room of \$200/week.

**WA** and **SA** were the only two larger states to record a increase in regional rental prices in August. WA jumped 1.56 per cent to \$325/week, against a 2 per cent rise in SA (now \$255/week). Regional NT renters would have noticed a price spike in the month – median rents were up 3.89 per cent to \$467/week.

The only state to record a decrease in regional rents was **Tasmania** – down 1.82 per cent to \$270/week. The volume of properties leased across the regions increased from July to August, with the most significant volume upsurge in WA.

### Rent.com.au's Walk Score® data vs price-per-room

RENT's compared its Walk Score® data to price-per-room data across all properties leased in the month of August with an aim to identify price trends in areas with varying levels of walkability. Considering the latest data, the most affordable apartments meeting the Walker's Paradise criteria were in **Darwin** (\$220/week), while **Brisbane** took the lead for most affordable Walker's Paradise houses, just \$185/week.

Walkability continues to come at a price in Sydney, with Walker's Paradise properties setting apartment hunters back an average of \$400/week – higher than all other states. The data was consistent for house prices – highly walkable properties averaged a price of \$333/week.
